These last few months have been a little sad for me. Mikey who I have known for almost 20 years was an alcoholic and had cancer. He was such a character. Whether I saw him at the Broad Street Market or at the soup kitchen, "kath-a-leen" he would say in a loud voice, to which I responded "Mikeeeeee." He went to a rehab and died warm, sober and safe.

Two months later I received a call, a veteran, Charles had passed away. In 2009 he was homeless sleeping outside St. Stephens Episcopal when he was saying his feet really hurt and needed socks. When I gave him socks and looked at his feet, I immediately took him to the ER. After surgery, a stay at Bethesda Mission as I was working with the veterans people to get his discharge papers so he

could be admitted to the Veterans Home in Altoona. He was there for many years.
